According to the 2016 New Jersey Statewide Airport Economic Impact Study, general aviation airports in New Jersey support an economic impact of more than \$2.8 billion.

Aviation by the Numbers

According to FAA data, New Jersey is home to 36 public-use general aviation airports, 13,307 pilots, and 3,101 registered aircraft.

Number of Jobs

According to the 2016 New Jersey Statewide Airport Economic Impact Study, general aviation airports support more than 12,000 jobs in the state, with an annual payroll of over \$890 million.

Economic Impact

According to the same study, general aviation airports in New Jersey contribute more than \$2.8 billion to the state's economy.

According to FAA data, New Jersey is home to 54 repair stations, 7 FAA-approved pilot schools, 5,881 student pilots, and 2,109 flight instructors.

In addition, there are 39 fixed-base operators in the state, according to the AC-U-KWIK directory.

According to the University Aviation Association, flight departments in New Jersey include Atlantic Cape Community College in Mays Landing, Bergen Community College in Paramus, County College of Morris in Randolph, and Thomas Edison State University in Trenton.

Advanced Air Mobility

A New Jersey AAM strategic roadmap projects that establishing and growing an advanced air mobility industry in the state could create nearly 26,000 jobs over 15 years and generate an additional \$152 million in annual state tax revenue.
